Last year more than 800 farmworkers attended our classes and trainings. 



Grants

Grant funding not only supports our educational programming, but also shows that key governmental agencies, such as the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), believe in our work and in our ability to have a positive impact through education. In 2022, we were honored to earn the following highly competitive grant awards:

- The USDA 2501 Socially Disadvantaged, Beginning Farmers and Ranchers Grant, which provides \$347,700 of funds over three years. It's earmarked for programming designed to increase the profitability and economic stability of socially disadvantaged farmers and farmworkers in the Napa Valley through training and technical assistance.
- The CDFA Specialty Crop Block Grant earned \$447,441 in funding distributed over two and a half years. It targets programming focused on building and retaining the current and next generation workforce for Napa's wine-grape industry through mentorship, literacy and leadership education.




EDUCATION IS THE KEY TO ADVANCEMENT, PROFESSIONALLY AND PERSONALLY.

In every survey of our program attendees, English and financial literacy classes are the top requests. In response, we offer a range of instruction, from English and math-intensive classes to computer courses. For individuals with little to no education, these classes impact every aspect of their lives, from attending their children's school meetings to pursuing a promotion at work and providing a path to advancement.

The Student: Porfirio Martinez

"Harvest is when I am the most satisfied in the vineyard. It concludes a years-long worth of hard work and preparation," says Porfirio Martínez, supervisor at Carpenter Vineyards.

Born in Oaxaca, Mexico, Porfirio has been working in the vineyard for more than 35 years, beginning in Baja California, moving north to Fresno and then to Napa where he joined Carpenter Vineyards 28 years ago.

"I have liked pruning since I was a very young, and I was very fast. Since I began working, I have had several mentors. My first supervisor taught me how to prune a vine, how much space to leave, and if to cut the vine," Porfirio says when describing his career path, "When I arrived here, Dr. Carpenter, the owner of the vineyard who passed away, was a great mentor. He used to tell me, 'Whatever you do not understand, ask me and I'll teach you, or we'll find the answer.' And little by little, I began to adapt to the work."

Porfirio discovered the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation at a time when he was seeking more education. Since then, he has taken advantage of all the classes offered. His favorite is the English classes. "I understand a lot of English, but I need to practice speaking more. I also went to classes on pesticides and CPR, among others," he says, "If we are given the opportunity to attend classes, we are given the opportunity to broaden our knowledge, improve in our jobs, and improve as a person."

Vineyard Operations and Safety

MAINTAINING A HEALTHY WORKFORCE IS OUR PRIORITY. Our Vineyard Operations and Safety programs seek to achieve this by offering a range of educational opportunities, from forklift training to first aid as well as farming practices. The highlight each year is the Pruning Contest, where farmworkers compete for prizes and are judged on efficiency and quality of work. This opportunity to demonstrate capability and expertise, builds camaraderie and a stronger Napa Valley.

The Donor: Bill Nemerever

"It's important to me that farmworkers have opportunities for advancement," says Bill Nemerever, an avid supporter of the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation. Bill has been a long-standing champion for the foundation and a sponsor of the Pruning Contest, which thanks to the generosity of our donors, provides farmworkers with a platform to showcase their craft.

The dedication Bill has shown to the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation is a reflection of his lifelong appreciation of the Napa Valley. It was the destination for his honeymoon with his wife, Ginger, then a place to visit and bring friends when the young couple lived in Mill Valley. Later after moving to the East Coast, the Nemerevers began vacationing in Napa, with the thought that they'd retire here one day.

Leadership and Management

FOSTERING FUTURE LEADERS IN VITICULTURE IS CRITICAL for our industry. Each year, 250 vineyard workers and supervisors attend our leadership and management conference, recently renamed CULTIVAR. A three-day intensive program, CULTIVAR is focused on leadership and communication skills, viticultural best practices, and safety in the workplace. It's led entirely in Spanish by industry experts, both local and from other wine regions. And it is free for all Napa Valley farmworkers, thanks to our donors and sponsors

The Employer: Daniela Bazán

"The Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation helps connect farmworkers with vital resources, educational opportunities, and everything else going on in our community. That connection in turn inspires farmworkers to become more active in the community inside and outside of work," says Daniela Bazán of Bazán Vineyard Management/Bazán Cellars.

Despite spending her childhood running around vineyards behind her father, Daniela didn't intend to work in viticulture. Instead, she dedicated herself to studying, earning bachelor's degrees in Spanish and Latin American Studies from University of San Francisco (USF), a master's degree in Ethnic Studies from University of California at Berkeley, as well as a master's degree in environmental management from USF.

As the office administrator of her family's business, Daniela runs the day-to-day operations, from safety training to specialized projects in the vineyards. She's also instrumental in sending employees to CULTIVAR. Paying employees for the time they spend at the conference is an investment, one that Daniela recognizes has benefits. She says, "As a small company, to have these resources available to our staff is invaluable."

Daniela invests in her employees and farmworkers in other ways as well, including contributing her time and efforts serving on the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation's Education Committee. She says, "Opportunities like CULTIVAR empower farmworkers to assume more responsibility and

The Intern: Angel Alonso

"At each step, everything lined up just right to prepare me for the next one," says Angel Alonso, a 2022 Fields of Opportunity graduate. "First, I was in the summer program as an intern at Napa Wine Company. When it ended, I was hired by Walsh Vineyards Management, and when I finish school, I'll start a new job there."

As a young boy who was more interested in taking things apart than building them, Angel quickly

developed diagnostic and repair skills after buying his first car. And then came his internship with Napa Wine Company and his job with Walsh, where he learned to work on tractors and trucks. "I appreciate what I learned. I was never put in a situation that there wasn't someone there to help me if I needed it. And the people there are so qualified."

Now enrolled in school where he's studying diesel technology, Angel intends to become a mechanic, but he says he also learned to weld during his internship, so if he changes his mind, he has other options. "Fields of Opportunity opened so many doors for me. The connections I made make it easy to believe that everything will work out as it's meant to."



BUILDING COMMUNITY EXTENDS BEYOND THE VINEYARD and classroom for farmworkers and their families. Día de la Familia offers them the opportunity to connect with over 50 local organizations, from law enforcement to legal aid, in a fun-filled street fair, featuring health screenings by OLE Health, taco lunch, mariachi, and more. By providing access to resources, families are made stronger and feel more connected to the Napa Valley community-at-large.

The Community Partner: Blanca Huijon

"Día de la Familia honors farmworkers and communicates to them that they are an important part of the Napa Valley economy," says Blanca Huijon, Executive Director of Puertas Abiertas.

After completing college, Blanca joined Puertas Abiertas in 2010 as a Case Mentor and was appointed Executive Director in 2019. Today she is one of only four female Latino executive directors among all of Napa Valley's non-profit organizations. A first-generation immigrant, Blanca has experienced the similar struggles as the community she serves, giving her keen insight into how its needs can be met. She often addresses sensitive topics, such as health, wellness, immigration, food insecurities, and works closely with her community partners to assist the Latino community

to provide information and reliable resources, including workshops on becoming a citizen, housing, labor, consumer rights, among others. She also advocates for more opportunities for Latinos to join boards to ensure that the needs of our Latino community are heard.

Puertas Abiertas has helped organize Día de la Familia for several years. Blanca supports it because it honors vineyard workers. "Día is culturally appropriate. It includes families—kids can enjoy tacos, paletas, arts and games—which brings families closer together. But it's not a party, it's an opportunity for families to learn about different resources available to them," she says.

Puertas Abiertas advocates elevating the work and worth of vineyard workers, aligning seamlessly with the educational opportunities of the Farmworker Foundation. Blanca says, "I love the partnership with the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation, and I hope it continues to grow in the future."

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
